Brazilian Cultural Immersion

Many countries participate in an annual carnival. It is most often found in countries colonized by France, Spain, and Portugal. That is because carnival developed from a fusion of Catholic processions & festivities preceding Lent, and indigenous and African music and dance rituals. The biggest carnaval in the world takes place in Brazil where the whole country spends at least a week dancing in the streets!

In the southern state of Rio de Janeiro, hundreds of thousands of tourist join the millions each year participating in or watching the Samba competition in Rio de Janeiro.

In the northern state of Bahia, the biggest festival happens in the city of Salvador, known to be the home of the music and dance style known as Samba Reggae.

Samba is a fast-pace dance done with three steps: back on the right, in place on the left, close the right, then repeat starting left. See it performed in a routine here: https://www.youtube.com/wa tch?v=nM1p5AdHiJI
