### Family Portraits In Photography and Painting

In this project, students will look at a range of images of families and generate their own family portraits. Through images and discussions, students will learn the difference between a photograph and a painting. Students will learn to describe the contents of images in order to identify their meanings. Students will also learn to brainstorm ideas for the production of their own images. In producing their own images, students will use their own families as references for the production of family portraits. Students will enjoy looking at example images and translating them into reflections of their own experiences.
